As I sit down to begin writing and look back at our last newsletter, I am amazed and overwhelmed. Was it really just 12 months ago that we had our first open house, and received both Indy and Hannah to the ranch? So much has been packed into the last 6 months that it feels as if another whole year has gone by!

In late October, Arcy Linn, Carl's wife and co-founder of MSYR needed to be hospitalized. Then in early November, Hannah our little red filly took a fall while playing and sustained a painful injury. Throughout the months of November, December and January much time was spent visiting Arcy and doctoring Hannah. During that time we were still able to move ahead with projects at the ranch. Fence lines were moved to widen the road to be in compliance with CDF requirements. Temporary hot wire fences were put up to confine our curious horses so our arenas could be graded. Sides were built on our horse shelter in preparation for winter storms, and clean up and demolition of the old chicken coops were completed. We had a great time attending the

7th Annual Horse Owners Expo in San Luis Obispo, setting up a booth for the evening and sharing our vision and mission with other horse owners in our county. We also kept a conservative schedule speaking to The Chevron Oil Corp., The Atascadero Horsemen and The Almond Country Quilters. Thank you to these organizations for your generous support. Then on January 22nd, to our great sadness, our beloved Arcy Linn passed away. She will be greatly missed. Read more about her legacy on page 2.

February and March brought much needed rain to our area and although we thought we were prepared for our first winter storm our little shelter filled with water. We worked hard to give our horses a dry, wind free place to be before the next storm hit and laughed at ourselves when the mud attempted to suck off our boots. The much-needed rain gave us hope for a good barley harvest this year and enabled us to see where a drainage system was needed. We were able to place a few culverts for road drainage and to locate future areas where culverts will be needed. Mentor training continued in spite of the weather with a workshop designed to bring into focus our core values, enhance team working skills and help our volunteers determine their calling. Thanks to some generous dona-



tions we received fencing for our orchard and garden area, box stall panels, mats for our horse hospital and a 50ft trailer to serve as an office. His provision and miracles have no end! Thank you Ray and Pam. Hannah continued to heal and improve (thank you Dr. Szabo). After nearly 5 months of confinement Hannah's gymnastics began to let us know that her time of confinement would soon be coming to an end.



In April as the mud dried up tractors were again able to work the ground and we continued preparation for our arenas and drainage system (thank you Ray, Peter, George and Haydn). Dirt and sand have been donated and are being stored for our arena footing. Long awaited fencing of our alley way and pasture were started thanks in part to generous donations from the Speh Foundation and the Black Family. Another workshop on personal safety (thank you Marsha) was offered to our mentors as training continued in preparation for the ranch to open. We also attended "The Equine Experience", a 3-day expo on all things horses and the San Miguel Business Forum, an inaugural event to showcase businesses in San Miguel. We met some wonderful people and enjoyed sharing our vision for Morning Star. Our used tack shop at the San Miguel Flouring Mill has continued to be a blessing to us and we now also have saddles for sale at Santa Margarita Feed and Farm Supply, 22423 El Camino Real as well. We are continuing to give tours to those interested in this exciting ministry and we are building a waiting list of children anxiously hoping to come to the ranch.

We are very close to the time of moving our remaining two horses to the ranch with arenas and pastures safely set up so children can come to the ranch. FENCING- FINALLY FENCING! You have heard us talk about it for over a year now. We have shared our vision and our need for safe fencing both for our horses and for the safety of the youth that will work with our horses. You have generously donated to our fencing fund and

prayed for God to meet this need. You have helped fold sponsor letters and picked up sacks of donated cement, you have researched suppliers of pipe and wire. Thank you to all of you who have faithfully prayed and worked on our behalf to bring fencing to Morning Star. As of May we are approximately 75% fenced. We now have two of our three pastures enclosed with safe gates and shelters for this summer. Praise be to our Lord! Thank you Russ for working with us to accomplish this first phase. And thank you to Saulo and Saul Jr. for your hard work in making our fencing look like what we envisioned. Our next and last phase will include dividing the now existing east pasture in two, adding a gate and more shelter before this winter. Please continue to pray with us about finishing this project.

We receive calls regularly from folks who have special horses in need of a special home but because of our need to bring our two remaining horses home to the ranch and our need for fencing we have been unable to take in any more horses. However, when Mary (our blacksmith) would come to trim our horses she would bring tales of a precious miniature donkey named "Billy". Billy suffered regularly with

foot problems and caring for him was becoming increasingly difficult for his “parents”, Dean and Betty. Together they had raised Billy from the time he was 10 months old and loved him too much to see him suffer. After months of searching unsuccessfully for a suitable home where Billy's foot care needs would be met, hope was dwindling and humanely ending his suffering was being considered. Upon hearing about this dilemma, we began searching for a solution. A small co-op was formed to take care of Billy's expenses and a cattle pen was made ready for a temporary home. Within days we took off to bring Billy home to Morning Star. Picking up Billy from the loving home he had known for most of his life was bittersweet. Billy was going to miss his human and four legged friends. We were thrilled to have Billy but concerned that he would be lonely.

At the same time in Arroyo Grande another story was unfolding for a 19 year old miniature horse named “Teaspoon”. Teaspoon had been spending her life at “Fort Hope” a living History Museum for children, which replicated life in the 1850's. Due to a temporary closure all the animals at the fort needed to find new homes, and all had been adopted except Teaspoon. Knowing that Billy would do better with a friend, and hearing a similar story from Mary that Teaspoon had foot problems and needed a home, we set off to bring her home to Morning Star. Upon arrival we were greeted by Teaspoon, Leigh Ann her owner, a large German Shepard dog and a cute pygmy goat. After introductions and a short time to chat we were ready to head home. Upon opening the trailer, who should decide immediately that he was coming along - Yep, you guessed it. Midnight the goat announced with great delight that Teaspoon was his best friend and he was going where she was going. Leigh Ann confirmed Midnight's story, they were indeed inseparable, so Teaspoon jumped in after Midnight and we all headed back to the ranch.

Upon arrival at the ranch it was time

for introductions. The usual sniffing, squealing and who's the boss show commenced. Midnight bowed out immediately and let Billy, who had been king of his castle, and Teaspoon, who was the queen with her court, decide who would rule the new cow pen castle. Within a few minutes all was decided. Billy would act like the king but defer to Teaspoon when issues of importance like, where he should eat and who would eat first needed to be decided. By the following day they had become the 3 amigos, inseparable friends, complete with hilarious antics and telling the entire world they needed to get out and go for a walk RIGHT NOW!!
